For years the late Mr. I. G. Polk ran Polk's Grocery in the fork of the road, across from the gin. A short time before his death he sold the store and retired. It is now Allen's Grocery.

Mrs. Polk, the former Miss Molly Williamson, is a sister of the late Mr. Charite Williamson. She has six children.

Olen married Miss Gay Sylvest. He has a store and does some farming, too. Johnny and Tommy

are the two children in this family. L. T. is the only one of the children who is very far away from home. He is working for a power company in Arkansas. He married Miss Wilhelmine Elser. Their children are Carolyn, Ronnie, Dianna and a brand new baby.

Garvin married Miss Pauline Kraut. He has worked his corn crop and is working in New Orleans, Mrs. Polk stated.

Ralph married the former Miss Charlene Barrett. He works in Hattiesburg with the Hattiesburg Production Credit Company. Their daughter is named Gayle.
