Mr. McDaniel drives Marion County School Bus Number 45, Mrs. McDaniel says he has about seventy-one school children that he picks up and takes to school each day. He collects the Cedar Grove district students and delivers them to the schools in Columbia, going to the primary, grammar and high schools on his route.

He has been driving a school bus for about four years. Up until this year he would get back home and do some work on the farm. This time, however, bus rules are different, and Mrs. McDaniel says he can't get home as easily because the bus has to stay in town. That is one difference in driving a privately owned bus and a county owned bus.

Mr. McDaniel is a fox hunter, by hobby. Mrs. McDaniel said he hasn't done much hunting this winter. However, he can turn his fox dog and four puppies out and hear them running at night without having to leave the house.

Mrs. McDaniel says she guesses her hobby is house keeping. She has some nice quilts that she has quilted herself. She says she likes to sew.

She seems to like to make cakes. She said she didn't make a regular fruit cake this year, but she cooked a Japanese fruit cake. Do you know what a Japanese fruit cake is? fruit cake is.

Mrs. McDaniel says she puts raisins, nuts and spices in the cake layers. stay around the barn making "Where's a cat?" the pass word among the rodent population.

The McDaniels listen to WCJU quite a bit. Listening to the Sunday morning devotional while getting ready to go to church and Sunday School at Cedar Grove is a part of the day's activity. In addition to taking an active part in his church Mr. McDaniel is a member of the Marion County Farm Bureau.
