

# Enoch Pittman Owns Mystery Farm No. 60, Located Near Sandy Hook

Mystery Farm Home Number 60 belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Enoch Pittman, Route 2, Foxworth. The farm is located about nine miles south of Foxworth on Highway 35, toward Bogalusa.

The son in the family, Scott, is in the first grade at Hopewell school, where he is making new friends.

Mr. and Mrs. Pittman were married in 1947. About three years ago they remodelled the house. After making the changes they wanted, the house was covered with gray asbestos siding. Mrs. Pittman says there was a little house on the farm when they started living there, which they lived in a while before remodelling.

A free flowing well furnishes all the water needed for the house and for the livestock on the place. There are no stock ponds, as yet, on Mystery Farm Number 60. The artesian well is 650 feet deep and Mrs. Pittman says cost a plenty, but it is worth it.

Mystery Farm Number 60 contains eighty acres within its boundaries. There are approximately twenty-eight acres in cultivation. The balance is in pastures and wooded area.

The fifteen head of beef-type cattle have plenty of territory to graze. The pastures are mostly of native grasses which furnish plenty of grazing for them when this type of grass is in season.

There is a nice barn a little distance north of the house that furnishes plenty of storage space for the corn and hay grown on the farm to be fed to the livestock.

The Pittmans have one pig that they are growing to put in the deep freeze when the time comes.

Chickens produce more eggs than can be used at home. Surplus eggs are sold.

There is no cotton on the farm. Most of it is in corn, but there are several small plots of different types of truck crops during the year. These plots furnish something to go in the large deep freeze that Mrs. Pittman says goes hand in

hand with her garden.

She says she doesn't think she could get along without the deep freeze and the other electric appliances that are in almost every home with a power line coming to it, she has a vacuum cleaner.

Mrs. Pittman says this vacuum cleaner is very handy for many things in addition to cleaning rugs and carpets. She uses it for cleaning the walls and finds it especially useful for cleaning her venetian blinds.

Cooking is done on a butane stove which Mrs. Pittman likes very much.

Mr. Pittman likes to hunt and

fish. He says he throws the small ones back in the water. He enjoys still hunting for squirrels when in season. Squirrel hunting seems to be his favorite type of hunting.

Mrs. Pittman lists gardening and fishing as her hobbies. She says she really likes to work in the garden and tries to keep just about as many different things growing as she can. Much of the garden's produce goes into the deep freeze for future use.

She says she spends just as much of the summer on the creek bank as she possibly can. Aunt Ester, the old colored woman who lives on the place, helps her with the

fishing. Mrs. Pittman stated, as well as with some of the household work or anything else that needs doing.

The Pittmans belong to the Hurricane Creek Baptist Church. She is a member of WMU there. Mr. Pittman is a Mason.

Mrs. Pittman had a new quilting frame she plans to put into use soon. It was made by Mr. Pittman's brother, Fred, who has a home workshop and lives just a short distance from them.

The Pittmans are looking forward to many more happy years at Mystery Farm Home Number 60.
